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A Scout is Reverent

It is my sincere hope and prayer that everyone in our scouting families and their friends and families are well in this time of uncertainty and challenge. This is the first of regular communications that I hope will inform the members of our council up to date on membership and relationship efforts throughout the Greater Tampa Bay Area Council.

You may be asking yourself what a scout's reverence has to do with membership. I can answer that with one simple observation. Each of us in Scouting acknowledge that we have an individual Duty to God each time we recite the Scout Oath and Scout Law.

I have been giving some thoughts to how we can incorporate our Duty to God into the Scouting at Home programs that we are implementing during this COVID-19 pandemic and have come up with three recommendations.

- **a.** Work on Religious Emblems. Many of our partner religious groups have developed religious emblems programs to encourage their members to grow stronger in their faith. The Boy Scouts of America has approved of these programs and allows these emblems to be worn on the official uniform. Our various partners administer the programs. Working on religious emblems is appropriate for our Cub Scouts in the Scouting at Home environment since much of the work is accomplished in the family. Emblems for older Scouts BSA members, Venturers, and Sea Scouts require more personal interaction at a group level and may prove problematic under current conditions.
 - How can a Cub Scout get started on their emblem?
 - o Parents should obtain the specific information for the emblem of their faith.
 - Parents should review the program guidelines.
 - Families should talk with their religious leaders and/or emblem counselors and review the requirements before beginning the program
 - Where can you find the necessary program information?
 - Most Protestant and Independent Christian churches utilize the P.R.A.Y Program for religious emblems. Their Cub age programs include:
 - Jesus and Me (Grades K 1)
 - God and Me (Grades 1-3)
 - God and Family (Grades 4 6)

- Roman Catholic Cub Scouts can use the emblems program developed by the National Catholic Committee on Scouting. The Cub age programs include:
